Information Literacy (IL) - Proposed Way Forward

The Library aims to increase the amount of IL training provided to students within the curriculum across all levels and faculties. To be effective, it is essential that the delivery of this is integrated into programmes and well-timed so as to be directly relevant to students. There are already many good examples of IL teaching at the University of Ulster. However, in order to extend such practice to all students, the Library needs to develop a *Strategy* for embedding IL skills into the curriculum based on the SCONUL 'Seven Pillars' and which is endorsed by University Management.

Such a Strategy would help to develop closer collaboration between academic staff and subject librarians in order to improve integration of IL skills into university programmes for the benefit of students. As part of the Strategy, the Library would recommend that, for first years initially, at least one module at a particular level of study could be identified as key for inclusion of a significant IL element which would involve direct input from the subject librarians.

The Library would also like to see IL identified as a key skill in university programmes alongside the existing Ulster graduate qualities. In this way, IL should attain the profile in the curriculum which it needs in order to be adopted evenly across all subject areas rather than depending on ad hoc initiatives. This will be taken forward through a Library submission on how it will contribute to the implementation of the University's new Learning and Teaching Strategy.

To take forward the work of the Library's Information Literacy Sub-Group, below is a set of actions outlining the planned work of the Group over the new academic year.
